Tair Rafiq

TAIR Rafiq was born in Birmingham at the end of the 1960s, but he has lived most of his life in Rotherham, growing up in the Eastwood area.

During his childhood, he had few friends and resorted to creating imaginary companions. His closest companion was a toy rabbit named Benjamin, whom he acquired on a school trip to Filey.

Benjamin, with the ability to grow to immense proportions, served as Tair's protector. However, Benjamin is now retired due to loose stitching.

Tair has since grown both physically and

emotionally, becoming self-assured and capable of looking after himself. His interests include boxercise and daydreaming.
Two significant events influenced Tair's


early fascination with storytelling.

At the age of eight, he discovered a book called The Little Witch by Otfried Preussler, and at 10 he watched Star Wars. In those moments, he realised his lifelong ambition to become a storyteller and weave magic with

Consequently writing consumed all his spare time, gradually becoming his sole

Despite enduring bullying during his school years and being told by a university admissions interviewer that he lacked academic potential, Tair secluded himself from the world for over a decade. Writing became his solace, as he taught himself the craft of storytelling and world-building. With no one to critique his stories, he had

the freedom to make mistakes and learn from them.





Eventually, emerging from isolation, Tair discovered his own voice, one worthy of being

In March, Tair received a grant from the Arts Council England Lottery, fulfilling his dream and allowing him to leave his day job at a call centre to pursue his storytelling aspirations. Although he felt some apprehension about quitting his day job, the moment he received the confirmation email from the Arts Council, he promptly contacted his manager to tender his resignation. Writing demanded his undivided attention.

The transition hasn't posed any challenges for Tair. While he still maintains a day job, it no longer feels like work since he is doing what he loves. Every morning, he wakes up with joy, eager to engage in more writing. This opportunity feels like a key to a chocolate factory, a world full of possibilities.

Now, Tair has more breathing room and the luxury of time. Freed from the mental constraints imposed by his previous job, he can think more deeply and allow his imagination to thrive.

Tair believes writing is an inherent part of his being and struggles to comprehend a world without storytellers. To him, imagination is a vast toy box, gifted to every individual at birth. Regrettably, society often suppresses and diminishes this innate talent as people grow older.

Tair considers himself fortunate that his imagination has only grown more extraordinary over time.

Influential authors during his formative years included Edgar Allan Poe, H P Lovecraft, Harry Harrison's The Stainless Steel Rat series, Frank Herbert's Dune saga, J R R Tolkien, and the Asterix books by Goscinny and Uderzo.

Tair's mind is always engaged in the art of storytelling. If he appears distracted, it is likely because he is contemplating the adventures of vampires and werewolves venturing into outer space aboard a rocket ship. He possesses an abundance of ideas that he may never have the opportunity to fully explore in his lifetime.

Tair doesn't approach writing as a mere task to be completed but rather as a guiding light through the mundane realities of life. He is deeply in love with writing and devoted to it.

As someone who has never experienced writer's block, Tair finds it difficult to provide advice on overcoming creative obstacles. However, if pressed, he would suggest sitting down and writing, regardless of the content. Even if it seems like nothing, even the act of writing 'nothing' holds value. Moreover, Tair emphasises the importance of taking the time to think — a greatly underestimated practice. In a world that constantly demands productivity and busyness, humans are not meant to function like machines. Sometimes, they simply need a moment to pause and

Tair's storytelling often exhibits themes that are eccentric, mischievous, and surreal. He attributes this unique style to his lack of formal training as a writer.

When readers encounter his work, they can immediately identify his distinctive voice.

Tair finds himself naturally drawn to LGBTQ+ characters and themes, as he identifies with the struggles of this community. Having faced bullying and misunderstanding throughout his life, he knows what it feels like to be an outsider. Thus, he strongly believes in the importance of unity among outsiders and proudly considers himself an ally.

"Do it! If not now, when?" Tair passionately encourages others to seize the opportunity to live their lives to the fullest. Recognising the preciousness of a single existence, he firmly believes that it should be embraced and lived with purpose.

Presently, Tair is immersed in the development of his play for schools, entitled Paradise Square, funded by the Arts Council. It revolves around a mysterious woman endowed with the power to fulfil any dream except her own. Additionally, she possesses the ability to transform her appearance into anyone she desires, but never her true self. Accompanying her is a pet rabbit named Crusher, who has the remarkable ability to grow to enormous proportions.

Similar to many of Tair's works, Paradise Square holds elements of his own life experiences, making it semiautobiographical.

Ultimately, Tair hopes that readers and audiences will emerge from his books and plays with a sense of bewilderment, pondering the inexplicable experience they have just encountered.

Sean Webster

Even in his early years, Sean exhibited the qualities of a writer, being shy and introverted.

He discovered his passion for writing when he would craft long and admittedly terrible stories during his school days. While his friends handed in simple, worn-out homework sheets, Sean's assignments often spanned ten pages due to his penchant for letting his imagination run wild.

As the late '80s approached, Sean faced a

limited choice for a writing career and decided to pursue the growing field of IT instead of journalism.

He worked as a computer programmer for several years, enjoying the social aspects of office life. However, he felt an increasing frustration at not dedicating enough time to his writing endeavours while juggling a fulltime job.

The turning point came when Sean's office was forced to shut down due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Confronted with the realisation of life's fleeting nature and the need to pursue his ambitions, he made a difficult decision. Despite the sacrifices and the uncertainty of financial security, he enrolled at Sheffield Hallam University to pursue an MA in Creative

The transition to a full-time writing career has undoubtedly been challenging, especially in terms of the cost of living crisis. Sean maintains his focus by following a strict schedule, devoting the mornings of weekdays from 8am to 12pm to his writing as though it were a regular job. He actively searches for

ways to monetise his writing and chances to advance his writing career in the afternoons. When faced with challenges in his writing,

Sean finds solace in taking walks.

Sean's passion lies in stories set in the present day, where relatable characters undergo personal growth.

His true fascination lies in capturing the essence of human nature, delving deep into the truth to ensure that his characters' actions and words resonate authentically with his readers.

Influenced by esteemed authors like Stephen King, Sean greatly admires their skilful characterisation and compelling dialogue. Additionally, he holds a deep appreciation for timeless classics such as 1984, The Catcher in the Rye, To Kill a Mockingbird, and Lord of the Flies. These literary masterpieces have shaped his perspective and further fuelled his passion for crafting meaningful narratives.
